Summer Club

One of my favourite Summer songs is Paul Weller's: "Long Hot Summer". I play it every June in the vain hope of such a rare occurrence. This year, though, we truly were blessed by a long, hot Summer - the best apparently since 1976.

For a short while, Motherwell looked like earning a place in the Record Books as having the warmest temperature ever recorded in Scotland. The BBC News confidently announced: "Scotland has recorded its hottest ever temperature, according to provisional figures from the Met Office. On Thursday 28 June, a temperature of **33.2C** degrees was measured Motherwell. North in Lanarkshire."

Sadly, we were brought back to earth with a bumpy landing just a few days later when the Met Office did some backtracking: "Subsequent information has cast some doubt on the Motherwell measurement for that day, meaning that we will not be able to accept it as an official new record for Scotland." Unfortunately, I couldn't pass any comment as I spent that day on the Isle of Coll - some 150 miles away from Motherwell! In this long, hot Summer, my personal highlight was St Mary's Annual Summer Club: "The Greatest Show". Over the week, nearly 140 children attended with a daily average of about 110. It was a brilliant week, wonderfully led and organised by our excellent team of leaders and helpers. As Parish Minister, I would like to express my thanks to all involved in such an excellent enterprise. Along with the children of our Parish, I am already looking forward to next year's Summer Club!

<u>Harvest</u>

The ever-ripening fruit on the Manse garden apple trees, is a daily reminder to me that Summer is now waning, and that Autumn is just around the corner. With Autumn comes our Harvest Celebrations.

Harvest is a time to thank God for all the good gifts of creation that we enjoy in our daily lives. As the famous Harvest Hymn proclaims: "All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above; then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, for all his love."

Harvest is also a time to remember the need to share these gifts with one another. In Acts Chapter 2, the Apostle Paul tells us that sharing was a key feature of the Early Church: "All who believed were together and had all things in common; and they sold their possessions and goods and distributed them to all, as any had need." [Acts 2:44-45].

This Harvest Time, in a world where so much is taken for granted, and where too little is shared with those in need, may God encourage us to be thankful, compassionate and giving people.

This year, our Harvest Thanksgiving Service will be held on Sunday 7 October at 11.00 am. As normal, our food gifts will be donated to the work of the Motherwell Foodbank. Any monetary gifts received, will be given equally to the work of Glasgow City Mission and the Lodging House Mission - both excellent charities.

In the last edition of the Church Magazine, I announced that the Summer Services would be shorter in length at approximately 45 minutes. By-and-large, we managed to achieve this aim!

As we welcome the children and young people of Junior Church back to the opening part of our services, the aim is to keep the services at the one-hour mark. This may be a bit of a challenge on Communion and Baptism Sundays but, as Minister, I promise to do my very best!

THANK YOU FROM SCOTTISH ACTION FOR REFUGEES

A huge thank you from Scottish Action for Refugees (SAFR) and from Helen Calder to everyone in Motherwell St Mary's. Thank you to everyone in the youth organisations, to members of the congregation and their friends and family who donated so generously to the collection that took place at St Mary's on Saturday 19 May 2018.

87 boxes were packed full to the brim with winter clothes, shoes, toiletries, blankets and school supplies. On the day £140 was raised and a further £100 was kindly donated from the Royal Wedding event. Thank you to all the helpers from St Mary's who gave of their time and worked so hard to set up for the collection; to sort the clothes; to pack the boxes; to carry the boxes down the stairs and to clear up the hall after the event. Special thanks to the Royal Wedding guests for their kind monetary donation and to the bakers who made sweet treats for the helpers.

I am so proud and grateful that St Mary's took part in what was called 'Seven for Syria', so named because sadly there have been 7 long years of war in Syria and SAFR wanted to promote 7 ways for us to help. Since our collection in Motherwell, there have been a further 3 more collections and the final 3 will be 25 August, 1 and 8 September. To date, 400 boxes have been packed and an amazing £1500 has been raised. The boxes will be shipped out in September to arrive in Syria at the beginning of November. This will be SAFR's third shipment of donations from Scotland to Syria. Hand in Hand Syria, SAFR's partner charity on the ground in Syria, will distribute the donations as part of their winter programme and their support programme to schools in Syria.

The steps at the front of the church are being stripped by the work party and will be covered in due course by a means still to be decided.


The Menorah lights at the front of the church have been flickering on and off for some time now. They will, by the time you read this have been removed for a full restoration and be back with us soon.

Sizzling Summer Camp 2018



Summer Camp 2018 will be one of the camps that is talked about for a long time.... the weather at all future camps will be compared to the scorcher that was this year as we returned to Badaguish just outside Aviemore in the Cairngorms for our 2018 Summer Camp.

Getting there....Day 1

With 25 boys and 13 officers, the convoy of 2 minibuses, the Witzenmann van (a new camp supporter!), the Chapman's Landrover and trailer and a couple of officers' cars managed to load up and ship out all our camping stuff and luggage for 5 days of adventure.

After a lunch stop in Aviemore we descended on Badaguish and began the process of making ourselves at home - 11 tents had to go up, the kitchen had to be organised, 12 months of dust washed from our travelling crockery and utensils, the mammoth online shop had to be unpacked and the tuck shop retail outlet needed stocked and organised.

At Badaguish we have a great set-up that gives us best of both worlds - plenty of flat dry camping ground complemented by indoor cooking and dining facilities and a modern toilet/shower block.

The boys made an excellent job of setting up the tents so after an afternoon of settling in we enjoyed our first meal together and then set off for a stroll down to Loch Morlich to enjoy the fabulous evening sunshine. This is always the point at camp when we are reminded just how vicious the Aviemore midges are!!

The (Dreaded) Hillwalk.... Day 2

Sunday is the traditional camp hillwalk and is often 'dreaded' by the boys but by the end they usually concede that they have actually enjoyed it. We have our 'usual' camp hillwalk of the Meall a' Bhuachaille loop behind the campsite and in recent years we have also introduced the Chalamain Gap and Lairig Ghru route, but this year the stunning weather forecast allowed us to tackle something even more adventurous - Cairn Gorm and the northern corries or 'the headwalls' as the route is sometimes known. This takes you up from the ski centre car park towards Ben MacDui but crossing and climbing up Cairn Lochan and onto the Cairngorm plateau....a challenging climb in all weathers and especially

when there was no shelter from the sun (am I really writing this??). Seeing the headwall on the climb up was daunting but the view from the edge of the plateau was stunning.

On the first day we were mountain biking on the trails around Grantown and gorge swimming at Bridge of Brown where we explored a very narrow fast flowing and very freezing cold gorge!!

On the second day we tried something completely new - White Water Tubing essentially throwing yourself down a fast flowing river on a rubber donut - the boys all raved about the experience and the video footage looks great so we are looking forward to seeing the camp film!

In between all the planned activities the boys were kept entertained/busy by our staff team in football competitions, a quiz night and a big game of baseball on Loch Morlich beach.

St Mary's Summer Club enjoyed another highly successful week this year. The club has been running in the current format since 2004 and this year, as every year, we welcomed over 100 children every day. We also enjoyed the company of up to 50 teenagers, young adults and more experienced helpers too. It's wonderful to know that while our youngsters return day after day and year after year, the club also appeals to a wide range of adults too. Colouring-in, painting, rounders, playing parachute games, singing and dancing were popular with all ages this year and it was lovely to see different generations of our church family enthusiastically engaged in these activities together.

It has to be said, however, that when it came to meeting Christopher's giant African land snails, our younger participants were a little more enthusiastic than some of the adults.

This year's theme was The Circus and this proved very popular due to the recent musical film 'The Greatest Showman'. The young people, and plenty of the adults too, loved singing along to the sound track. The film's themes of teamwork; accepting the differences of others and being proud of who you are formed the basis of our daily talks provided by Bryce Calder.

Our youngsters are always divided into groups with the older children being led by Hazel Graham and the younger ones led by Jennifer Bradshaw and Joanne Morrison. Due to the warm, dry weather this year a further group of about 30 children were able to play sports in the Duchess Park every morning under the watchful eye of Des Bradshaw and Stuart Davies. Our big art displays, including a trapeze artist; Barnum's large elephant and a giant box of popcorn, were designed by Sarah Reilly and the older children really enjoyed creating these more challenging projects under her expert tuition.

Co-ordinating and catering for large numbers of young children is not easy and we were grateful, as always, to June Graham - known to all of us as Aunt June - and her team who ensured the children (and helpers!) were well fed and watered.

This year's circus theme meant that we took part in lots of side shows in the Avon Hall where we played skittles, made balloon models, played hoopla, hooked a duck and balanced on a tightrope. Other activities included: making juggling balls (and trying to successfully juggle with them!), creating mini trapeze artists, colouring animal masks, split pin clowns, making stilts from tin cans (and trying to balance on them!), eating freshly made pop-corn, singing songs under a parachute tent, attempting to beat the minister at football, designing and decorating our own t-shirts, learning new songs and dances, meeting a scorpion called 'Nipper' and making the ever popular friendship bracelets – a craft which effectively symbolises what this week means to all of those who are involved.

It is really difficult to summarise or put into words the atmosphere of our summer club. It might be described as a 'warm' as 'welcoming' as 'fun-filled' as 'noisy' - yes, it was definitely noisy! The whole building was buzzing, it was a hive of activity with busy helpers, excited children and smiling parents - and that atmosphere existed because of the enthusiasm and dedication of our large team. As leaders we would like to thank all the children who attended; the many teenagers who sacrificed a long lie during their school holidays and to the adult helpers who worked so hard - always with a smile on their faces!

As we enter the beginning of a new session, I hope that all leaders and helpers in our church are feeling refreshed after enjoying a glorious summer.

It has been some time since my last report owing to a fall on black ice and breaking my arm which then led to further complications. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your concern, prayers, cards and flowers which I am sure helped towards my recovery. It makes me thankful to be a member of a church where we are one big family.

In October last year I gave a report on all money, totalling £4,198, which had been raised by the Motherwell Action Group during the session. Bible Society projects in Haiti, Peru and Jordan benefitted from this. Since the beginning of this year the collection and selling of stamps has raised £95. The selling of home-made jam by Ellen Currie brought in a further £80.50. Unfortunately, our concert which was to be held last February had to be cancelled due to ill health.

At the present time we are in the midst of getting volunteers to participate or sponsor our walk which takes place in Strathclyde Country Park. This is in aid of Work in Iraq. Almost every Christian family still living in Iraq has been traumatized at different levels. They are suffering from depression and loss of hope. Their future prospects appear dark and unsure. They are living in anxiety and under the fear of continuous displacement. The purpose of this project is to offer training to a dozen of Iragi Christians in trauma healing to enable them to implement a healing programme in their circles and share their skills with other traumatized communities, such as the Yezidis The trained trauma team will work out of local churches to select the families in grave need of trauma healing. Food packages will be distributed by the local churches.

Once again I thank you for your loyal support and prayers.

We are very fortunate to have a fantastic team of willing 'Aunties' who support our Toddler groups every week in the kitchen. We would like to thank them all for their continued support.


<u>Waiting List</u>
