

Dear Friends

CHRISTMAS

That was Christmas that was. Year by vear, the Advent season comes, celebrated more and more in anticipation - and in a few days, it all seems to be over. It's followed quickly by the end of the year; it's bound up with Hogmanay; and as the New Year comes upon us, Christmas, like 2014, slips into the past. It's often more like an ending than a beginning. Yet we know that Christmas celebrates a new thing, the beginning of a life, which like no other, had its impact on life on this planet, in its effect turning the world upside down, a life which seemed to have ended on Calvary's cross but which reached its climax in Resurrection - a life where love and power still transform human life and challenge and empower our living.

CENTENARY

That was "Centenary" that was. Our 100th Anniversary was celebrated with great anticipation, over the months, indeed the years before December 2014 came. And now that great year has passed, with its climax in the 2 very special services in November and December. It was inspiring to have our "old boys" sharing in our worship throughout the year, at the Congregational Dinner, and especially in the remarkable Anniversary Service. It was uplifting to welcome the Moderator, Rt Rev John P Chalmers, to our pulpit at the Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication.

You notice I use the word "climax"; sometimes we spoke of the culmination of our celebrations. Avoided always "conclusion" were the words or "ending", and this was guite conscious and deliberate. For in the Christian Church there is no conclusion, no finality to what we do as God's people in our time. The tradition of the faith goes on; the worship of the church continues; the call to work and witness comes increasingly; to play our part in Christ's mission is an ongoing challenge.

I point you to Bill Simpson's article in the Bulletin, to his summary of what has been "quite a year" and his thanks offered to all who had a part in it, to the congregation as a whole, to individuals and groups within it who enabled us to do so much and achieve so much over the last year or two especially to the Centenary Action Team whose members served indefatigably to make whole the enterprise such a success.

I want to express, in unrestrained terms, the thanks of the congregation, of the Centenary Action Team, and my Bill himself for own, to the chairmanship he offered and the leadership he provided, over some 3 years, for the whole Centenary Event. I think he thoroughly enjoyed the experience; certainly he filled his role masterfully, a role for which he was eminently suited, in which his gifts of organisation, planning, and of maturating and encouraging, of sweettalking and cajoling and verbal armtwisting were well used, and his leadership was very much "hands-on". The vast amount of time and energy, and thought and imagination, the level of commitment he gave to his task, his overseeing of all aspects of the event underpinned its great success.

I am very aware, as the year turns, that I am entering the last lap of my own ministry in St Mary's. At Christmas, and indeed every week now we see me engaged in something for the last time. My own ministry here is coming to and end a conclusion a culmination a climax

Certainly, "Centenary" has provided a great "high" for me personally. I am immensely grateful for the vivid signs of vitality and energy, of commitment and drive which have been so evident in the last couple of years.

Some plans are already being set in place for a period of vacancy which will be a challenging time for the officebearers and congregation. But I shall not be mentioning "retirement" again and again in these coming months, for the work goes on.

And the congregation must look ahead with hope and expectation and with prayer that there will be found the guidance and inspiration of the Spirit of Christ, present in this church, and the sense of purpose and determination to maintain the tradition of shared faith and fellowship which have been so strikingly displayed in these days.

May God bless you all in this new year.

I hope that you have enjoyed a peaceful time over the festive season and I wish you good health and happiness in the New Year.

During the month of September a retiral offering was uplifted at our morning service in support of the work of Scottish Bible Society. The sum of £829.39 was raised. This was an excellent amount and much appreciated by Bible House in support of their work.

The Commonwealth Games came to Glasgow and to commemorate this special event Scottish Bible Society came up with the idea of distributing Penny Gospels. This snowballed into something bigger than what they could ever have imagined. Three quarters of a million Penny Gospels were distributed - equivalent to 30% of Scottish households. Twelve hundred were distributed to the Parish of St Mary's with the Centenary Logo marked on them to commemorate our own special celebration. The Penny Gospel is a special edition of Luke's Gospel featuring inspiring stories of sportsmen and women who believe their faith is worth 'more than gold'. The name *Penny Gospel* resonates with local people who remember "a well-known market place in Glasgow's East End where you could pick up a bargain".

The Motherwell Action Group are holding a concert on Saturday, 14th February, at 7.30 pm in Crosshill Church. 'Octave', a renowned vocal group who claimed 'best in class in the Mixed Voice Choir Section' at the Glasgow Music Festival in 2013, will be performing on the night. As this is our main fundraising event, please come along and give us your support - it will prove to be an excellent night's entertainment. The proceeds raised from this concert will be in support of 'Survivors of the Genocide in Rwanda'.

Throughout 2014 if you have listened to the radio you may have heard the following introduction before news and current affairs programmes. 'In a year like no other, a station like no other, BBC Radio Scotland'. The same sentiment with a little adaptation could also have been used in relation to our Centenary Celebrations.

'In a year like no other, a Church like no other, St Mary's Parish Church Motherwell'.

It has been quite a year! In addition to the normal rhythm of our morning worship, there have been 6 special services associated with our Centenary year. The service to launch our Centenary year in January, our Centenary youth service in February, the service to mark the laying of the foundation stone in April and our Centenary songs of praise in September. In November at our anniversary service we celebrated 100 years of worship in our Church, and in December we had a final service of thanksgiving and re-dedication. All of these services were uplifting, inspiring and special, each in their own way.

Other events in our Centenary year included the Centenary Congregational Concert, the Pilgrimage to the Holy Land, the Centenary Family Quiz Night, our Choirs in Concert for the Centenary and our Open Church from May until August. Towards the end of the year following harvest thanksgiving we held our Centenary Harvest Lunch and finally the Centenary Congregational Dinner in Motherwell Concert Hall with some 300 in attendance for what was a fine evening and a memorable occasion. Included with your bulletin is a flavour of some of the highlights of the Centenary year.

May I take this opportunity to express my thanks to all who have played their part in our Celebrations. To the members of the Kirk Session who approved the plans for our Centenary Celebrations and provided unfailing support. To the congregation whose generosity in financial terms and constant support at the many events made it all possible and worthwhile. There were also many individuals who gave freely of their time and talents and significantly added to the execution of our planned events. Finally, to the members of the Centenary Action Team - a special word of thanks. It has been a privilege to lead such a team of dedicated, committed and enthusiastic individuals.

The trappings of our Centenary year have all but disappeared. The banners have been removed, the notice boards with their array of photographs and merchandise will be replaced with information pertaining to 2015, and our weekly intimations from the pulpit will be devoid of talk of Centenary. That said, whilst our Centenary year has drawn to a close the CELEBRATION of our faith and witness within the family of St Mary's and beyond, by The Grace of God, will no doubt continue for many years to come.
