Dear Friends

Among these eleven will be the hundredth elder I shall have ordained across the years; we will then again have over a hundred members of the Kirk Session.

I am sure you will offer them your good wishes as they take up this role, that you will support them in your prayers and encourage them in this work, and that you will welcome them into your homes when they take on responsibility for a district within the congregation.

I like very much the tradition, not followed in any other church I know, of elders processing into church before the Sunday service begins. This tradition goes back to the days when St Mary's was a small congregation and the elders numbered no more than a dozen and a half. Shift work in the pits and the steelworks meant men (and they were all men in these days!) were often uncertain as to whether work commitments would allow church attendance and it was not clear, until the last moment, who would be present to uplift the offering! So, all elders met in

the Session House, now the lounge, where duties were allocated, before they all came into church together. As members increased and duties were operated by a rota, the tradition was maintained and has happily continued to this day.

So, from the end of November, eleven new faces will appear in that "procession", the faces of those who have already shown wide commitment to the life and work of St Mary's. Some have strong family ties congregation going the generations; some have come from other congregations and denominations of the Christian Church; some have become members of St Mary's in recent years. All have been involved in the organisations and activities, with their own families, and made already a valued contribution. I am they will greatly enrich congregational life; in themselves, they represent the continuity of the work of the church. People come and go; ministers come and go; but the Kirk Session at the heart of the congregation goes on!

I'm looking forward with somewhat mixed feelings to my own retirement and demission from the charge of St Mary's. Of this intention, I have informed the Kirk Session and the Presbytery of Hamilton, and it is right that the congregation should be aware of it. During the month of March, on the 15th, I shall conduct my last service in St Mary's but of that, enough for the moment......

For I'm looking forward with great excitement and anticipation, as I'm sure you all are, to the climax of our Centenary Year celebrations, in November and December. My last year in St Mary's has been a very special one! Indeed, the last 2 years have been full of interest and variety, of thanksgiving and blessing, of hope and praise, as we've looked back over our remarkable story, rejoicing in heritage, and finding new stimulus for the future. Read Bill Simpson's article in this Bulletin which offers a detailed description of the 3 events which will celebrate the climax of our Centenary Year, the Congregational Dinner, and the 2 very special services, when in fellowship together we shall express our gratitude for the past and our commitment for the future.

Thanksgiving and Rededication, these must be our twin themes and both will be at the heart of our worship: at the Anniversary Service, led by ministers who have had their place in the story of St Mary's: Rev Cameron Mackenzie will preach at that service; and at the Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication, when we will welcome the Rt Rev John P Chalmers, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. We are immensely grateful that John is able to share in our worship, that day, the nearest Sunday to the date of dedication of the Church, the 12th December 1914, and to bring to us the greetings of the National Church. suggested in the last Bulletin that this is the first occasion when a serving moderator has occupied our pulpit; no one has contradicted me so we shall welcome John all the more warmly for that!

I look forward with confident assurance to a magnificent turn-out of our members at these 2 highly significant services, when our thanksgiving and

rededication will surely combine to make these acts of worship full of blessing and inspiration.

We celebrate the 100th anniversary of our fine place of worship, but it is in the story of the people whose vision and hope built it that we find our inspiration to thanksgiving and dedication. As they built our church, as succeeding generations and our own generation have added to and enhanced the building, so the congregation has built and built upon the faith of those who have gone before.

Our church stands as a striking symbol, offers a parable, paints a picture, if you like, of the ongoing story of Christ's Church in this place. "Let yourselves be built, as living stones, into a spiritual temple to offer sacrifices, acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. You are the people of God," says Peter's Letter, using the same picture language. That's the calling to which our fathers and mothers in the faith responded, the calling to which we dedicate ourselves in these days of celebration, and for the future, God's future, on which upon generations will built.

May we all know God's blessing and his renewing power, in these days of celebration.

The AGM of the National Women's Guild of the Church of Scotland took place on Saturday 6 September at the Caird Hall Dundee. St Mary's Guild was represented by a delegation of 4 ladies led by Mrs Claire MacKenzie, Convenor of the Presbyterian Council.

The meeting was opened by the newly elected National Convenor/Chair, Mrs Kay Keith who gave a very warm welcome to all and in particular to the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the Rt Rev John P Chalmers and to the representatives from Jamaica, Africa and the Czech Republic.

The theme was Go Serve and both the Rt Rev John P Chalmers and the Rev Dr Margaret Fowler, representing Jamaica, gave their views and opinions from their vast knowledge and experiences of working, not only within, but outwith the Church: working with the aged, those addicted to drugs and drink, the poor and the destitute in our local communities. Rev Dr Fowler also encouraged the church to lobby our local members of the Scottish Westminster Parliaments for changes in policies to help those less fortunate than other.

The guest speaker was the landscape artist John Lowrie Morrison who gave a most interesting speech on the History of Art, from pre Reformation to the present day and described how he tries to depict the wonders of God's Creations on canvas. Brighton's Praise Group performed a medley of hymns and songs with which there was audience participation. The meeting closed with a prayer by Linda Young, the National Vice Convenor who wished everyone a safe journey home.

In all, the day was most informative and thought provoking and the fellowship with our sisters, wonderful and hopefully, the delegation from St Mary's can bring some new ideas to the Guild in this new Session.

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

The Monday 6th October saw the start of this year's session and it was good to welcome a large turnout of members, our first speaker of the year was our Minister. In his talk titled "Rambling Reminiscence's" Mr. Doyle told us of

his life from his childhood in Motherwell through his move with his parents to Glasgow and his subsequent schooling before going to study at Glasgow University and further research at Cambridge University, where he realised that his future lay in the Ministry of Word and Sacrament and Parish Ministry.

Judith Roebuck spoke of the work and responsibilities of Historic Scotland, from Listed Buildings to Historic Monuments and National Heritage Sites, showing pictures of sites, some of which were in the local area. These include, the gardens at Dalziel House, the office building in Park Street, formerly Colville's Office and the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Coursington Road

A look at "Old Lanarkshire Part 2" with Mrs Margaret Anderson, a Historian and Tour Guide picked up from where she left off last year and brought us from the Roman times through the development of gravel roads and turnpikes (Toll Roads) constructed by both Telford and Macadam. These roads saw a move away from fording and ferrying of rivers to the construction of Toll Bridges. The growth of mining and the production of iron and steel led to the construction of the Monklands Canal and eventually the introduction of the railway network.

We look forward to the forthcoming visit of the Rev John Harris as he "Reflects on a Motherwell Ministry." The forthcoming program once again makes use of the talents of a number of our church members, notice of which can as usual be found in each week's church intimation sheet.

We will resume after the Christmas break on Monday 12th January 2014, when one of our Elders Mr Stuart Greenhorn talks on "A Day in the Life". Be assured that a warm welcome awaits you on any Monday evening you may find it convenient to join us. We meet in the Conference Room at 7.30 pm.

Christian Aid' partners in **Sierra Leone** are working flat out to protect people from the Ebola virus. 200,000 disposable gloves and 360 kg of powdered chlorine have been given to health centres and medical teams. 1.8 million people are being targeted with advice on how to avoid becoming infected. Emergency quarantine measures have left people without food and parents face the dilemma of having to break quarantine in order to feed their children. Christian Aid's partners are distributing food and supplies to people in their own homes so they don't have to leave.

Across Pakistan, India, Bangladesh and Nepal flash floods have submerged hundreds of villages and triggered landslides. Christian Aid's partners are already on the ground delivering food, shelter, medicine and other life-saving essentials.

In **Iraq**, an estimated 1.2 million people have been forced to leave their homes. It is thought that 200,000 people are living in terrible conditions in refugee camps across northern Iraq. Christian Aid's partners are distributing hygiene kits, food and clothes to displaced families.

In **Gaza**, Christian Aid is supporting its partners on the long road to recovery from the recent conflict. St Mary's special appeal contribution of £704.55 was much appreciated. The letter of thanks to the church ended with these words:

"Once again, thank you so much for your continued support of our work with and for the poorest communities on earth. With your continued help, we can make a difference."

February 1947 Bulletin - Children's Corner

"On a little hillock in Central Europe there is an old-fashioned church called the Church of the Lanterns. If you went into the church and looked round, you would be very surprised to find that it has no lights at all, no electric, gas or oil lamps. It wasn't that the builders forgot to put in the lights. No! The old landlord of the district who built the church arranged that for every seat in it there would be a little lantern made. These lanterns were kept in a cottage just at the foot of the hill, and everyone who came to worship God in that church, first collected a lantern and then took it with him to light up the House of God.

If you went there on a wintry evening you might see a line of people passing by in the darkness and you would know that they were going to church because each one would be carrying a lantern, sending out a beam of light into the darkness of the night.

Why did the old man think of such a plan? Possibly to make sure that each person in the village would go to church. Each one could say to themselves "Now I must not forget to go for if I do there will be a corner in the church unlit, one seat in darkness. I must go and take my place and help light up the church."

It's true, too in our homes, school, place of work and at play we can be lantern-bearers, shedding light everywhere bringing happiness and cheer if we have dwelling in our hearts, Jesus who is the Light of the World."
