Getting there....Day 1

With 22 boys and 11 officers (all resplendent in our new heather grey BB hoodies), the convoy of 2 minibuses, the Witzenmann van and the Chapman's offroader and trailer we managed to load up and ship out all our camping stuff and luggage for 5 days of adventure as we headed for Badaguish just outside Aviemore in the Cairngorms for our 2023 Summer Camp.

After a lunch stop in Aviemore we descended on Badaguish and began the process of making ourselves at home - 10 tents had to go up, the kitchen had to be organised, our travelling crockery, cutlery and utensils washed, the mammoth online shop had to be unpacked and the tuck shop retail outlet needed stocked and organised.

At Badaguish we have a great set-up that gives us best of both worlds - plenty of flat dry camping ground complemented by indoor cooking and dining facilities and a modern toilet/shower block.

The boys made an excellent job of setting up our brand new tents under the careful guidance of Mr Greenhorn so after an afternoon of settling in we enjoyed our first meal together and then set off for a stroll down to Loch Morlich.

The Hillwalk....Day

Sunday is the traditional camp hillwalk and this year we returned to a walk we last did

in 2017 - the Chalamain Pass. This was selected as an adventurous walk for the boys with a great sense of achievement without being too challenging (not everyone agreed on this!!) or prone to the bad weather that was forecast. It was a great hillwalk - 15 kilometres including a rocky scramble through the Chalamain Gap, into a section of the Lairig Ghru for lunch and finishing with a long walk through the Rothiemurchus Estate back to the campsite.

Activity Days.... Day 3 & 4

Monday and Tuesday were both days of organised activities where the main event of the day was provided by an outdoor activity company. This year we again partnered with Gemma and Calum at Able2Adventure who are based at Badaguish and laid on an excellent set of activities for us.

Over the 2 days the boys learned to paddle board on Loch Morlich, gorge walked (lots of jumping in!) the River Feshie at Feshie Bridge, abseiled down a 20 metre cliff behind Loch Insh and canoed Loch Morlich in Canadian canoes.

We had loads of fun moments particularly when 'helicoptering' on a giant paddle board or plunging into a deep pool on the gorge walk and all are captured on video ready to be edited into the camp film!

What else....?

In between all the planned activities the boys were kept entertained/busy by our staff team in football competitions, a quiz night and a big game of baseball on Loch Morlich beach.

This year we had to completely replace all our tents and a big thank you to a number of supporters in the congregation who helped financially towards this. The new tents were excellent and look brilliant in our campsite.


Summer Camp 2023 was another memorable camp in the perfect location, awesome activities with a wonderful group of boys who have all come home with memories that will last a lifetime.

During the Summer weeks Summer Sundays met in the hall at 10.50 am for activities and games for all ages run by a rota team of parents and friends. My thanks to all who took part.


Session 2023/2024 looks to be just as busy as last year and already plans are in the making for our special Sunday for Harvest.
