

Centenary Fun Day

Early on a very wet bank holiday, Monday 2nd May 2016, the excitement for around 100 boys in Motherwell was building over breakfast and the weather couldn't do anything to dampen it, no matter how hard it tried.

It was the day of the Centenary Fun Day - a day when all the boys from across all 3 sections of 13th Motherwell Company would travel to Carronvale House, the headquarters of the Boys' Brigade in Scotland, for a day of exciting activities to mark the end of our Centenary Session.

The advance party of officers had left Motherwell in pouring rain just after 7 am to head to Carronvale to meet the activity providers and get set up for the day ahead but by the time the boys were boarding the coaches at 9.30 am the rain had stopped and the sky was clearing.

Ninety-three boys, 23 officers, some helpers and some Anchor Boy parents and a few special guests all descended on Carronvale just after 10 am to start a day of very carefully planned activities that would excite and challenge the boys and that would undoubtedly create memories to talk about at the 125 anniversary!

The activities included a HUGE inflatable obstacle course, a surf board simulator, sumo wrestling, knock your block off, Rollapaluza cycling challenge, human table football, bungee run basketball, x-box zone, laser tag and team relays. The boys were divided into groups and moved round the

activities throughout the day with only a short break for the packed lunch provided by Carronvale. The weather stayed fair throughout the day and everyone had an absolute ball. Following our lunch we all assembled outside the front of Carronvale House and managed to get a wonderful photograph of the whole Company at the home of the BB in our Centenary session.

The coaches on the way back to Motherwell were full of what had been the favourite activity and who had managed to go the fastest on the bikes or who had fallen off the surf board first.....that is until 5 hours of activity caught up and people started to nod off (including the officers!)

Back at St Mary's the barbeque team led by chef Taylor had been busy preparing a feast so that when 130 tired and hungry 'fun-dayers' arrived back to be met by parents there were enough burgers to go round. The Avon Hall was packed and the parents were treated to a film of highlights from the day so that they could visualise just how much fun we had had.

The current P3 boys also received a certificate of promotion and a BB water bottle as they move onto the Junior Section.

Squad 3 won the Best Squad award, a culmination of team points throughout the session.

Jack Sharkey won the best attendance trophy with Finlay Clark, Iain Robertson, James Mitchell and Jamie Reid all getting runners up medals.

UPDATE

Christian Aid Week 2016 began with the children of the Junior Church bringing a forest of red balloons into morning service and the Junior Choir delighting the congregation with their singing. The service was followed by lunch hosted by our enthusiastic young Christian Aid Support Team.

Each year, Christian Aid highlights a particular person or group of people in desperate need to be the focus of their publicity for Christian Aid Week. This year, they introduce us to Morsheda, who lives on a low-lying island in Bangladesh. She shares a single-room, corrugated-iron house with her four children.

She earns as little as 74p a day doing backbreaking manual labour. She has no savings. And because floods are a terrifying part of everyday life, she doesn't even have a safe place to call home. When the river levels rise, Morsheda worries that it might be like the worst time the floods hit. She remembers how desperate she was. How she hurried to build a makeshift raft for her frightened children. How they scrambled to safety as huge waves crashed against their house. How she prayed the raft wouldn't capsize as it tipped and plunged on the swirling waters.

'Morsheda and her children live a precarious life. They know that the floods will come again, and soon. But we can lift our neighbours like Morsheda to safety.

Just £250 is enough for a Christian Aid Home Safety Package. It could flood-proof Morsheda's home, raising it seven foot on an earth plinth, keeping her family safe at last.

It could also buy a goat, seeds and a wormery to help produce compost, so Morsheda could keep livestock and grow crops on the small patch of land around her home.

Christian Aid reports back on the change in the life of Loko, a woman in Ethiopia, featured in last year's publicity. Loko now has a cow and two goats which give her hope for the future.

Oko has said 'I am very happy. It is difficult to explain my happiness. I believe my financial problems will change soon. I thank God. I pray to God to bless those who gave me the animals.

I was simply a daily labourer who had nothing. People did not respect me in the community. Somebody who has no animals has nothing. Now, because I have animals, the community members respect me. If I ask for help or request support, like for food or equipment, people will support me.


My dreams are my livestock. The milk from them will bring income to the family which will help me to realise my dream of feeding my children very well, dressing them and sending them to school. My other dream is to open a shop in the village centre and to have a business.

I am a member of the self-help group and it is a great privilege. Previously, I did not know about the importance of saving and credit. But now, I have started saving a little bit of money from the sale of fire wood. My saving will help me to get a loan from my group when I need it.

My children now go out and play with their friends. Before we received the animals they were seen as different because they did not have animals and people did not show them respect. They were afraid of going out and playing with their friends. Now, they can go out and play with other kids nearby our village as they are now children from a family who own livestock.

You gave me hope and confidence which helped me to gain respect from the community. For these all, my gift is a blessing. May God grant you good health and a long life.'

We all have favourite times of the year and Spring is mine. I love the rebirth of plants in our gardens pushing their way through the hard winter soil, the white/pink flourish that decorates our trees and, of course, land carpeted once again in a calming shade of green. New life gives us hope and that is something very precious to hold onto.

Our concert, held in Motherwell South Parish Church was in support of 'Light of the Amazon'. This project helps to fund a boat to travel along the Amazon River and reach areas that are often otherwise inaccessible. Provision of Bibles and other Scripture materials is supplemented with conducting medical and dental care to the riverside people. This raised the sum of £1,500 - an excellent amount.

Marcia Carneiro, who lives in the city of Sao Paulo is Communications Manager at the Bible Society of Brazil and visited Scotland in April. Norman Liddle, Community Fundraising Manager for SBS asked if he could bring her along to meet our Action Group. We spent a most enjoyable evening and learned a lot about her country. On her return back home she sent me an email expressing her thanks and wrote:

"Knowing that there are people who are concerned with helping my people and my country moved me and made me very grateful. Furthermore, the affection you all showed me was really something special and unforgettable. I am very grateful to you. Once I got back to work, I met with my team and showed them a picture of you and said: These are people who are concerned with us and who have never been here in Brazil before. They were all so happy! We prayed for you and your families and thanked God for what you are doing."

This expression of thanks goes straight to you all in our local churches. A big 'thank you' for supporting us in what we do.

On Sunday, 28th August, we are holding our Sponsor Walk round Strathclyde Park. The project schosen is 'Iraq - Bible Based Trauma Counselling'. Almost every Christian family still living in Iraq has been traumatized in so many ways. They are suffering from depression and loss of hope. They are living in anxiety and under the fear of continuous displacement. The purpose of this project is to train Iraqi Christians in trauma counselling which would then allow this program to take place in the many traumatised communities, such as the Yezidis. Please give us your support for this project.
