#### MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> October saw the start of this year's session and Vice President Bill Taylor welcomed a large turnout of members, our first speaker of the year was church member the Rev John Thomson who gave an illustrated talk on his time as a chaplain in the Territorial Army and his overseas placement in the war torn area of Bosnia.

The work of St Andrew's Hospice and its future development plans were explained by fund raising coordinator Lorna McCafferty, presentation showed recent her photographs of the improved facilities at Airdrie. A lively question and answer session followed her talk. Mr John Patfield, fellowship member, offered members a free copy of a book of poems which is produced by a local poetry group in support of the Hospice, suggesting that although offered free a donation should be made to the Hospice.

In his talk entitled "It's Only an Hour a Week" Mr John Williams a Boy's Brigade Officer in 2/4<sup>th</sup> Company and a Battalion Training Officer spoke of the work of a modern BB company. The talk was enhanced by the use of video and photographic presentations produced by the boys. The theme only an hour a week showed what could be achieved by dedicated officers and boys who applied themselves to the aim of the Advancement of Christ's Kingdom among Boys and in doing so reflected the involvement of young men in assisting and caring for the local community

# UPDATE

Christian Aid, with your help, continues to respond to humanitarian emergencies as well as carrying out its ongoing development work.

Sometimes, both types of work overlap. This happened recently in Haiti, where Hurricane Matthew left a trail of devastation in its wake. Christian Aid has been working in Haiti for nearly 20 years and was there before, during and after the hurricane. This enabled the organization and its partners to help evacuate people to shelters and make sure the shelters were stocked with food. When people emerged from shelter after the hurricane, thousands had lost their homes, corn and banana crops had been flattened and livestock had been swept away. Christian Aid, through its local partner, distributed hygiene kits, shelter kits, food kits and roofing materials.

In South Sudan, where conflict has disrupted harvests and caused food and fuel prices to rise, over 4 million people are in urgent need of food.

The ongoing conflict in Syria has seen hundreds of thousands killed, half of the population forced out of their homes and more than 4 million people seeking refuge outside their country. Christian Aid is working with churches and other agencies to provide basic essentials for refugees who continue to make exhausting and dangerous search of journeys to Europe in sanctuary.

As we prepare for Christmas celebrations with our own families, there will be opportunities in the church to contribute to the work of Christian Aid. Please continue to do so with your customary generosity.

"Let the little children come to me," Matthew 19:14



The plane landed safely on our return from holiday. While we waited at the carousel for our luggage, I switched on my mobile 'phone and immediately a bleep, bleep sounded. A message was there to be read 'A reminder that the church cleaning work-party meet up again on Monday'. I couldn't help but smile as I thought how quickly I was brought back down to earth! On the Sunday at church I looked around at all the familiar and well-known faces in the congregation and it moved me at how I felt so fortunate to be part of a large Christian family in a safe environment.

Unfortunately, that isn't the case for all of us. Thousands upon thousands of Christians live their lives in fear. Aida lives in Iraq. She and her husband lost their young daughter who was snatched by the ISIS militants. It's difficult to imagine how it felt for Aida and her husband to have their daughter taken from them before their very eyes, unable to do anything. Unfortunately, stories like Aida are far too common as many Iraqi Christian families have suffered immense trauma and persecution at the hands of ISIS. Many have made perilous journeys with the hope of reaching Europe to start a new life free from persecution. Many more are living in refugee camps with nothing more than the clothes they were wearing when they fled their homes. In addition to having limited fresh water, adequate nutrition and medicine, many refugees are living with the debilitating effects of psychological and emotional trauma.

The Bible Society in Iraq is running a Bible-based trauma healing programme. Using trained volunteers, thousands of refugees are beginning to understand God's love and care for them. They discover that they can take their pain and suffering to the cross for healing from the trauma they are experiencing. Through God's Word, people are finding hope.

The Motherwell Action Group, as you may know, supported persecuted Christians in Iraq by a sponsored walk. Sponsorship from St Mary's raised £400 and I take this opportunity to thank those who sponsored me. The total amount raised was £1,707. It was a most enjoyable walk round the Strathclyde Country Park on a lovely Sunday afternoon.

A point of interest - did you know? The Rev Thomas Torrance, little known in Scotland, born into a farming family in North Lanarkshire in 1871, is respected in China for the unique cultural contribution he made there during his decades of missionary work. It is believed that he is only the second Christian missionary whose contribution to China has been officially recognised and highlighted by the authorities, following the dedication of a memorial to the famous Scottish runner Eric Liddell. At one point he was on the Communists' blacklist and was hunted by the authorities. Now things have gone the other way and he is being honoured. In 1910, Rev Torrance accepted an invitation to be the American Bible Society's superintendent for West China of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
