Dear Friends,

When the local press was informed of my impending retirement, the first headline read "sad farewell", which sounded a little like an obituary, the next read "fond farewell" which had a little more warmth about it; I'm wondering what the headline might be next week...... glad...... timeous...... thankful...... happy..... or what?

My last Sunday in the pulpit was charged with emotion; it was great for Alison and me to share in a service of worship which expressed the nature of the lively, hopeful, generous, faithful and committed congregation which is St Mary's; tonight's farewell social was a most touching event. We are immensely grateful for the generous words of Howard Rennie and the Rev Stuart Dunn, offered on behalf of the congregation the Christian and community; we are immensely grateful for the overwhelming generosity of the congregation expressed in the gift presented to us. My own words were really an expression of thanks for the privilege of serving as your minister over these 27 years, and I can do no more than sincerely echo them in this letter thanks to so many individuals, leaders and office-bearers ..... and to you all as a worshipping, praying, giving and serving community, to which you and I must be proud to belong, a community which sustains and advances the ongoing purposes of Christ's Kingdom.

And on-going it is: that's a word I over-use. For though ministers come and go, the life and work of the church goes on. And it is my conviction that St Mary's has a great deal to do and to achieve in the future, in maintaining its high tradition and in looking ahead, with faith and trust in the enabling power of Christ.


We shall be remaining in Motherwell: we have been here as a family for 27 years, myself for nearly 40 years. We look forward in retirement to crossing your paths, in a rather different capacity, in the days to come, to sustaining friendships happily formed in the church and in the town.

You will be well served by the experienced Arthur Barrie, as Interim Moderator, and the team he has assembling. I wish you well during the coming months when it is all the more important that the fellowship of the congregation should be vigorously sustained.

I end with words from Paul's letter to the Philippian Church, his favourite church, which I quoted this evening: "I thank my God for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion."

So, my farewell to you, as minister of St Mary's is ..... a happy ..... and a deeply grateful one. May God grant you his richest blessing in all the days to come. May you know his power enabling you and his love surrounding you as you look, in faith and trust, to the future.

The end of an era came on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> March 2015, when after just over 27 years service The Rev David W Doyle led the worship and preached his last sermon as our Minister. The spontaneous and sustained round of applause as he went to greet worshippers leaving the service was evidence of the high regard and esteem in which he is held.

The Gathering on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> March 2015 to celebrate his Ministry in St Mary's was an evening of music and reminiscences. The evening started with an Organ Recital by the Organist, Mr Ronald Mackie. The Chairman for the evening, Mr Allan Joyce, after congregation welcoming the and friends, introduced the speakers and the musical items provided by the Senior Choir and the Inbetweeners. The entertainment concluded when both groups came together ending an excellent evening's entertainment singing, How Great Thou Art and I'm Gonna Sing. The choir were led and accompanied by Mr Ronald Mackie Choirmaster and Organist and the Inbetweeners were led by Mrs Karen Maxwell and accompanied by Mrs Lesley Niven.

The Rev Stuart Dunn former Minister of Crosshill Parish Church and colleague of Mr Doyle's spoke of the close relationship which existed between them and the 2 congregations. As Interim Moderator during the last vacancy he was conscious of the fact that he was not only helping St Mary's to find a Minister but he was also looking for a good neighbour as the manses were adjoining, looking for that special someone who would be the kind of Minister who would meet the needs of the Congregation and keep the grass cut. Stuart was delighted that in both of these aims he was more than successful having discovered an excellent colleague and firm family friend.

Mr Howard Rennie in his remarks on behalf of the congregation highlighted the many landmarks which had been reached and aims achieved during Mr Doyle's long and fruitful Ministry. Howard in his usual comfortable and humorous manner, he offered advice on how to approach retirement and avoid the pit falls associated by over stepping the instructions given by the lady of the house, especially when dispatched to the supermarket. In his conclusion he offered thanks and best wishes to David and congratulated him on having had the gracious and ever reliable support of Alison and the family.

Session Clerk Mr Allan Joyce presented a gift to Mr Doyle from all in the Congregation expressing thanks to him for his unstinting service and on the Congregation's behalf expressed best wishes for a long and happy retirement.

Mrs Margaret Joyce presented Mrs Doyle with a floral basket.

Mr Doyle spoke of his time in St Mary's expressing thanks to the Clerks to Board and Session and particularly to Sheila Sinclair and Margaret McCloy for their work and ready assistance as church secretaries. He concluded by thanking Mr Joyce for organising the evening, for his kind remarks and the Congregation for their generous gift.

Interim Moderator Rev Arthur Barrie expressed a vote of thanks to all who had contributed to the evening, which was closed in a short act of worship after which light refreshments were served in the Avon Hall.

My thanks to Miss June Graham for the Floral Decorations in the church and Mrs Sheila Brown and her team of lady helpers for the excellent and abundant refreshments.

The first meeting in February we were joined with the Guild and had a pleasant evening in their company, when the Captain and a group of officers and boys told of the work of The Boys' Brigade.



### CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 10-16 MAY


