Dear Friends:

One of my favourite Christmas books is Charles Dicken's "*A Christmas Carol*". I usually read it every December.

One of the 3 ghosts to visit Ebenezer Scrooge is the "*Ghost of Christmas Past*". The Ghost takes Scrooge on a journey into the past and allows him to revisit some of his Christmases gone by.

When I look back over my own life, to Christmases gone by, the lasting memories I have are not of presents and parties, but memories of the sheer WONDER of Christmas.

I remember singing in school nativity plays - being so excited by the Christmas message: by angels and shepherds, wise men and stars, Mary, Joseph and the baby born in the manger.

I remember, in my teenage years, carol singing on Christmas Eve with the stars literally twinkling in the clear night sky. Funnily enough, my selective memory doesn't seem to contain any cloudy Christmas nights.

And I remember attending Watchnight Services in the beautiful surroundings of my Home church, Bo'ness Old Kirk; feeling my spine tingle with excitement just through being there and singing the old carols and hearing the Christmas story being read aloud.

Christmas is a time of great WONDER because the events of the first Christmas in Bethlehem were so momentous; so momentous that they changed the world for ever. Jesus, speaking in John's Gospel, sums

up the Christmas message in one powerful sentence: "***God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him may not die but have eternal life.***" [John 3:16]

The WONDER of Christmas is this: that on that first Christmas the LOVE of God for us became a human-being; the Son of God became a baby - Jesus Christ our Lord. As the great Christmas Carol Proclaims: "*LOVE came down at Christmas*". What an incredible, mysterious, wonderful, life-changing event the birth of Jesus was and is and always will be.

Advent, the 4-week period leading up to Christmas, is often fraught with stress; not least the stress of shopping and trying to get everything exactly right for the big day. Amidst the stress of the festive season, my hope and prayer are that the WONDER of Christmas might light up each of our lives in a special and precious way in these days ahead.

Helen and I are very much looking forward to spending our first Christmas in Motherwell with our new church family.

This Advent and Christmas time, and into the New Year to come [2018], may the LOVE of God fill your hearts with hope, joy and peace.

## MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> October saw the start of this year's session and it was good to welcome several new members to a large turnout of the Fellowship, our first speaker of the year was our Minister and Honorary President, The Rev Bryce Calder who gave an interesting insight into his life in his talk "from Met to Ministry" in which he told of his experiences as a police officer before being called to be a minister in the Church of Scotland.

The work of the Windmills Café was highlighted by church elder George Andrew, the café supports people with various disabilities, widening their range of experience and in some cases preparing them for future employment.

Mr Stuart Robertson, who was brought up in St Mary's spoke of the difficulties in raising a child with Autism in his talk "Whose Disability is it Anyway - a Father's Tale" he talked of the various levels in the Autism Spectrum and the need for a wider understanding of the problem. Stuart is involved in the work of charitable organisations supporting people and families concerned with Autism.

Church member Mrs Hilary Kidd spoke of her early years and schooling when she was motivated to become involved in politics and the Scottish Youth Parliament, following her graduation and despite serious health issues she subsequently qualified as a Solicitor. Hilary is at present a director of the "Young Scot" project of which she is an ardent supporter, promoting the welfare, needs and aspirations of all young people.

Mrs Yvonne Waring provided a most entertaining and enlightening one woman show on the life of Joyce Grenfell, interspersed with poetry and song.

The forthcoming program once again makes use of the talents of a number of our church members, notice of which can as usual be found in each week's church intimation sheet.

The Fellowship will resume after the Christmas break on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> January 2018, when we will be pleased to welcome back to the Fellowship Mr Bob Dalziel who will give us his slant on our National Bard.

I have pleasure in writing this report, highlighting the successful fundraising events that have taken place during the past year in aid of 2 worthy causes supported by the Motherwell Action Group of the Scottish Bible Society.

Our concert last March, held in St Mary's, in aid of 'Haiti - New Words: New Life' raised £980. We were delighted with the turnout of people. Brats & Callets entertained us and the evening was enjoyed by all. Again many thanks to those who contributed baking, helped to set out tables and last, but not least, cleared up at the end.

Our annual Sponsored Walk round Strathclyde Country Park in August proved to be a successful day. The sun shone and with bottles of water and crisps, we set off for our 4 mile trek. An excellent sum of £1,817 was raised in support of the project 'Peru: Bread of Life'. The project goal was to contribute to the overall development (nutritional and spiritual) of 400 poor children who live in rural communities in Cusco and neglected areas in Pachacutec in Lima by providing nutritious breakfasts, Scriptures and Bible teaching. Through daily contact with the children, two specific needs are met:

**Spiritual:** that the children should meet God in the person of Jesus through the teaching of Bible stories and the age-appropriate materials provided.

**Physical:** to contribute to improving the children's nutrition, reduce childhood diseases and raise their learning potential through a daily breakfast.

I'm sure you will agree with us that this is a worthy cause.

During the month of September, St Mary's had a retiral offering at the end of our Sunday services. This raised the grand total of £639.23 and this amount was included in the sum of £1,000 sent to Bible House by the Motherwell Action Group in support of 'Bread and Bread' a project which provides relief packages, Scriptures and emotional support to refugees in Jordan. Here is Salma's story:

'Salma and her husband ran a local shop in Syria. They lived a comfortable life with their seven children. But then the bombs were dropped. Salma and her family left everything they had and fled for the safety of Jordan. They didn't think it would be for long. However, 3 years later, Salma's home town has been all but destroyed. The family has lost everything - their home, the shop, the life they used to know.

In the midst of all this, the Bible Society in Jordan has found the family an apartment - basic, but a home nevertheless. They have introduced Salma to a local church, where she has been attending a weekly women's group. That was where the biggest change happened. There, Salma shared her worries and received prayer. She was given a Bible and through reading it she met Jesus - the Jesus she now puts her faith in.'

*"Jesus makes life worth living, even though I own nothing," she said. 'The Bible is everything in my life. I've changed. I believe God brought me here from Syria, to go from dark to light.'*

A story told by one, but one that so many others might share.

I'm delighted to say that Christine Brown has joined our Action Group and I have no doubt that she will be a great asset to us in the future.
