Dear Friends:

Easter, in the Northern Hemisphere at least, is a time of renewal. As winter gives way to spring, so new life begins to blossom in gardens, fields and farmyards all around us. Whether it's the new-born Easter lamb in the countryside, or, daffodils in our gardens, signs of new life aren't hard to find at Eastertime.

One of Jesus' key images of the Christian life is taken from the language of gardening and horticulture and it involves the theme of renewal: "Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." [John 12:24].

Here, in this simple agricultural truism, is a clear allusion to the path that Jesus was to take and the Path that we ought to follow. For Jesus, the path of death and resurrection. For us, the path of renewal of dying to sin and being born anew in Jesus.

Without the death of Jesus there would be no resurrection. Without the cross there would be no forgiveness, freedom and fullness of life. Without Good Friday there can be no Easter Sunday.

Easter is not only about resurrection, it's about death followed by resurrection. And in the death and resurrection of Jesus we discover a new and better way of life; a way of life based on forgiveness and renewal. As we follow in Jesus' footsteps, the negative aspects of our lives are encouraged to wither and die only to be replaced with the fruit of the Holy Spirit - those positive qualities of "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control" [Galatians 5:22-23] that were such a central part of Jesus' life.

Through the cross we have been "crucified with Christ" [Galatians 2:20] and are "dead to sin." [Romans 6:11]. Through the resurrection we are "alive to God in Christ Jesus." [Romans 6:11]. The Christian Life isn't about striving to be good people in our own strength but dying to sin and rising with Jesus to renewed life, Easter Life, resurrection life - a life in which we are transformed in Christ's image. And as Jesus transforms us, as Easter people we go in His name to renew the world around us.

Throughout this Bulletin, you will find lots of exciting ways to celebrate Holy Week and Easter 2019. May this sacred season be a time of blessing for you and all those whom you love.

We then had a presentation from the Rev Derek Gunn, Chaplain to BBScotland on Faith in Young People, our project for this year. We held a coffee evening to which we invited our own BB representatives: Stewart Maxwell, BB Captain; Alan Brown, Battalion President; Stuart Reid and Ian Carrol, Guild elders. We have raised £300 for this project. The organisation of our project night is in the capable hands of our Project Partner - Joyce Knox.

We had a relaxing evening when we welcomed Susan Mitchell who spoke to us on holistic therapy and demonstrated face, neck and shoulder massage. We were also able take part by doing hand massage which proved to be most relaxing.

The Rev Gavin Black visited us and gave a most thought-provoking talk. Dorothy Russell, chaplain at Shotts Prison spoke on her work with the prisoners and the challenges faced on their release. When one of our speakers was unable to attend we joined with the Men's Fellowship to hear of the challenges faced by David

Gardiner as he took part in the West Highland Way Race and plans to take part in this challenge again this year.

At our AGM we disbursed funds to the Church, the Junior Church and the Summer Club and we appointed Isabel Johnstone as President, Marlene Thomson as Vice President and Jean Mitchell as Secretary for the new session.

On that evening we were able to acknowledge the contribution 24 of our ladies have given to the

Guild over many years by the presentation of certificates signed by the General Secretary of the National Guild, Iain Whyte.
