SUMMER

As I write for the Summer edition of the Church Magazine, I am reminded that it is almost 2 years since I was Inducted as Parish Minister of St Mary's Parish Church. It continues to be a delight to be a part of such a fabulous Church Family with so many excellent people of all ages.

During the summer months many of our regular Church organisations take a well-earned break. With our annual Summer Club, Prayer Walk, Sunday Morning Services and much needed building upgrades, however, life will continue to be busy at St Mary's Parish Church.

Like last year, our Sunday Summer Services [30th June, 7th July, 14th July, 21st July, 28th July, 4th August and 11th August] will be shorter [45 minutes]. If the "Summer Suns" are indeed "glowing", this will allow us all to make the most of the rest of the day! Although I've yet to finalise the theme for the Summer Services, "Summer in the Psalms" is a distinct possibility.

During our Sunday Services there will also be lots of exciting and enjoyable Summer Activities for our children and young people.

Last Summer we held a very successful Prayer Walk round different areas of our parish. A Prayer Walk is a very gentle but effective way to demonstrate that we, as a Parish Church, are at the very heart of our community. This Summer we will hold a Prayer Walk on Wednesday 11th July. If you would like to take part, we will meet in the Avon Hall at 7.30 pm. Folks, in groups of twos or threes, will then take a short walk around a section of our parish - no more than a few streets. The idea is that, as you walk, you use your senses to lead you in prayer for the people and places you encounter. For example, if you are walking through the Duchess Park and see and hear children playing on the swings, this may lead you to pray [silently in your heart and mind] for the children and young people of our community. After our short walk, we will then meet back up again in the Avon Hall for some refreshments and a quick de-brief.

The Prayer Walk is open to folks of all ages and will be a fun, enjoyable and spiritually rewarding experience. Let's hope the weather is kind to us!

This Summer, Helen and I are looking forward to paying short visits to the beautiful Islands of Coll and Crete. Wherever you go this Summer, whether you stay at home or travel far abroad, may you know the peace and blessing of God.

Inspection Results

Throughout the session the boys undergo a weekly inspection in which points are awarded for each individual aspect of their uniform, clean hands and face, attendance at Church/Sunday school and behaviour. The weekly scores were collated and the results were announced during the night. There was a best squad along with individual prizes for the 2 runners up positions and the boy with the highest score was awarded the coveted BBig Cheese Award. The results were:

Euan was a very deserving recipient of the BBig Cheese as he has been runner up the last 2 years and his behaviour throughout the session has been flawless.

Special Recognition Awards

After the annual heated discussions and debates among the officers, decisions were eventually reached about which boys should receive the session's special recognition awards and are detailed below. These decisions seem to become tougher and more stressful every year - which is testimony to the incredibly dedicated and deserving group of boys we are fortunate to have in the Junior Section.

Best in Year

One of the ways we acknowledge individual merit is by selecting a 'Best in Year' for each of the 3 year groups. This year these prizes were awarded as follows:

1st Year - Andrew Hamilton 2nd Year - Nathan Cameron 3rd Year - Kyle Rankin/Jude Irving

These boys demonstrated excellent commitment and enthusiasm to various competitions and activities throughout the session and they were consistently polite and diligent in their approach to all Junior Section tasks.

Sportsman and Leading Boy

We also had an award for Best Sportsman which this year went to Riley Lafferty, for his excellent sportsmanship behaviour; his eagerness to include others in team activities and his commitment to fair play.

Our Leading Boy trophy is designed to acknowledge the important role our squad leading boys play within the Junior Section. Leading boys are 3rd years who have been selected by the officers to be responsible for 'leading' their squad. This means ensuring their squad is well behaved during

opening and closing services and supporting younger members of the section throughout the night. This year the officers chose to give **Cailean Doyle** this award because his good nature and friendly approach has enabled him to set an excellent example to boys in his squad and in the wider section.

<u>Crawford Award of Effort and</u> Enthusiasm

This award for the boy who has shown the most effort and enthusiasm is voted for by the boys in the section. All boys are eligible for the award and each boy casts an anonymous vote.

When the votes were counted the clear winner of the award was Zack Fleming. When the officers saw who the boys had voted for they were delighted, as he would have been the officer choice as well! Zack's kindness and willingness to help others is unprompted, genuine and something that has been on display every single session night this year. He always shows up, listens up and steps up. His effort and enthusiasm has been apparent and abundant.

Endeavour Shield

The individual award held in highest esteem within Junior Section is the **Endeavour Shield**. This is presented to the boy the officers think has made a significant contribution to the Junior Section and who has strived to exemplify the motto of the Boys' Brigade in all his endeavours. This year our deserving recipient of the Endeavour Shield was **Tyler Weir**.

Tyler has made significant contributions to several competitions over his years in junior section, but is always modest in acknowledging the part he has played. He is great at involving boys from all years in games and has a great sense of fun and sportsmanship. He is unfailingly polite,

dedicated, well liked and respected by boys and officers alike.

Vote of Thanks

The parent's night always ends with a vote of thanks and I'd like to end this article in the same way.

I especially want to give a special thanks to the officers of the Junior Section, (especially Greg McLaughlan) for all the extra leadership and service they have put in this session to compensate for the times I have not been there due to maternity leave. They have all stepped up and excelled at maintaining and nurturing the Junior Section ethos of fun, kindness and respect.

I would also like to give a very important thank you to the parents and families who so willingly support the section throughout the year at battalion competitions, BB events and at our weekly session meetings. WORK PARTY




The Work Party meet each Monday around 9 am, finishing around 12 noon.

PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

CROSS SQUARE PATTERN

Use 4.5 mm needles

Double knitting wool (300g) or Baby DK wool (200g)

Cast on 17 stitches

Row 1-4: knit across

Row 5: knit 2, purl 13, knit 2

Row 6: (All remaining even rows, KNIT across)

Rows 7, 9, 11, 13, 15: knit 2, purl 5, knit 3, purl 5, knit 2

Rows 17, 19, 21: knit 2, purl 2 knit 9, purl 2 knit 2

Rows 23, 25: Repeat row 7 Row 27: Repeat row 5 Rows 29-31: knit across

Row 32: Bind off

SHAWL PATTERN

Use 6.5 mm (old 3) needles

Double knitting wool (300g) or Baby DK wool (200g) Cast on 63 stitches or any multiple of 3 such as 54, 57 or 60

First row: knit 3, purl to the end of the row

Repeated row: turn and knit the purl stitches and purl the knit stitches

The suggested size is 24" wide x 60" in length Use any remaining wool for a fringe that can be 3" to 9" long.
