Dear Friends:

COVID-19

When I wrote my last Church Newsletter, in January, the Covid-19 outbreak was something that was happening thousands of miles away in the Wuhan Region of China. As I write today, in mid-March, we find ourselves in the midst of a pandemic that is completely changing societies across the world - including our own. The word 'unprecedented' is one which is so often overused. These, however, are without doubt 'unprecedented times'.

At our Kirk Session Meeting on 11 March, a St Mary's Covid-19 Response Team was set-up to guide us as a congregation through these difficult and uncertain times. Alongside myself, the Session Clerk and Deputy Session Clerk, the Team comprises members who have expertise in the fields of health-care, health-and-safety, education, business management and church management.

Following government advice, the Church of Scotland announced on Tuesday 17 March that Services of Public Worship will have to cease for the foreseeable future - until such times that the government feels that the pandemic is under control and large-scale gatherings are safe.

Following discussions with the St Mary's Covid-19 Response Team I have decided that a short Worship Service will be filmed each week and this will be made available on-line via our Church Website www.stmarysmotherwell.org.uk This service will include a Bible Reading, Prayer, Reflection and Junior Church Challenge - as well as any up-to-date Church News. You can access the service each Sunday Morning or any time throughout the week.

In addition to a short Weekly Worship Service, I will provide additional worship materials on the website, including: a short Communion Service and serialised readings from the Bible - read aloud by myself.

During this time, our Junior Church Team will be actively engaging, again on a remote basis, with our children and young people - providing them with on-line teaching, encouragements and Bible Challenges.

Pastoral care of all Church Members will continue to be of the highest priority as we go forward. Your District Elder will keep in regular touch with you via telephone. If you have changed your phone number, or, think that we may not have it on our Church Records, you can easily let us know: either e-mail your number to our Church Secretary Margaret McCloy on margaret.mccloy@stmarysmotherwell.org.uk, or call the Church Office on 01698 268554 [the phone has an answering machine, so you can leave a message].

As Minister, rather than home visits, I intend to move to telephone contacting. In the first instance, I will call those over 70 who have been recommended by the government to take social distancing measures. However, if you would like to speak to me, for any reason, or, at any time, please don't hesitate to call the Manse landline on 01698 328665, or my mobile on 07401949831 [again both of these numbers have an answering machine and you can leave a message].

As we keep in pastoral contact with one another, we hope to be able to offer practical help to those who are self-isolating and who are in need of basic help - such as shopping. We realise that not everyone will have family that can help, or, have access to on-line shopping.

The latest advice from the Church of Scotland concerning the Covid-19 Pandemic can be found on the Church of Scotland Web-Site www. www.churchofscotland.org.uk The Church of Scotland are updating this information on a regular basis, so please visit the site often.

Another useful website, especially for older members, is that of Age Help Scotland: www.ageuk.org.uk/scotland Age Help Scotland also have a telephone helpline: 0800 12 44 222.

The landmark report, "Church Without Walls", was the highlight of the 2001 General Assembly. This report affirmed that the Church is not just a building, but a people. In the coming weeks, as a Church Family, we may not be able to meet together in our beautiful Church building in Avon Street for our regular Church Services and Groups. This, however, does not stop us from being 'The Church'. There are 3 important things that we can do: please use all the on-line worship resources that are made available; don't hesitate to be in contact if you have any pastoral or practical needs; and remember to pray for one another at this difficult time.

EASTER

Easter 2020 will certainly be very different this year. The message of Easter, though, is one which is eternal and unchanging:

Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed!

Easter means that Jesus is with us always - wherever we are, whatever we are experiencing, and however we feel. Easter means there is hope even in the midst of despair, peace in the midst of turmoil, comfort in the midst of fear, and love all around us

In concluding this pastoral letter, there are 2 powerful verses in Paul's Letter to the Romans which, I believe, speaks to these turbulent and uncertain times: "I am certain that nothing can separate us from God's love: neither death nor life, neither angels nor other heavenly rulers or powers, neither the present nor the future, neither the world above nor the world below - there is nothing in all creation that will ever be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord." [Romans 8:38-39].

As your Friend and Minister I would like to wish you all a safe and blessed Easter 2020.

An Appeal For Members to Sign Up to Standing Order Giving and Giving Through Gift Aid

At present the World is in the grip of a very serious contagion and everyone's concern is for those who are or who may be affected by this disease.

All necessary steps will be taken to ensure the safety of our Congregation and if you were in Church recently the offering was taken at the door and the counting of the money was left for a week to allow for any viral germs on the notes and coins to dissipate throughout the week.

However in practical terms, not only are all of our structures within the Church - the Sunday Service, Communion, the Youth organisations, Junior Church, the Guild and the Fellowship etc. - under pressure, but also our whole financial structure will be tested to the limit if, as is likely, numbers attending greatly decrease.

If the decision ultimately was to close off assemblies entirely then this could pose us very serious problems.

No one knows what will happen in the future or how long this pandemic will last. We do not know when or if the Government will take the decision to put the country into lockdown. Therefore, I have to plan ahead for the worst case scenario.

Income will be greatly reduced and if Sunday services are to be banned in the future we would have an immediate shortfall in cash on a monthly basis.

As it stands we have an income of £4,000 per month through giving by Standing Order and if that was to be our only income over a number of months, our break even figure of £12,000 per month would not be met, leaving us with a shortfall of £7 to £8k per month.

The more members who sign up to giving through Standing Order, at this difficult time, will assist us in ensuring that we are able to meet our considerable financial obligations. I foresee that we will have to use a sizeable portion of our Reserve Fund and consequently the works planned for with this money, may require to be deferred.

One way of raising extra money, without any further cost to the individual, is for every $\underline{\text{tax paying}}$ member of the Church to sign up to giving through the Gift Aid scheme. Last year we received £23,000 from the Government as Tax Recovered on this Gift Aid giving.

It works very simply, the member signs a form to agree to Gift Aid and subsequently we claim tax recovered back on every £1 given at the rate of 25%. For every £1 given we receive back 25 pence, for every £100 given we receive £25 and for every £1,000 we receive £250 and so on. The more of you who agree to this the better will be our financial position.

I am very confident we will survive this severe test to our finances and hopefully with an increased number of members contributing through Standing Order and Gift Aid we could gain back some of the money lost and hopefully have a sound financial base for the future.


