Dear Friends:

The last few months have been a frightening and difficult time for so many of us - as we have lived thorough one of the worst world health crises in modern history.

As I write, the COVID-19 pandemic may be on the wane here in Scotland, but across the world it continues to grow. Its affect is felt especially in some of the poorest parts of the globe.

In Matthew's Gospel, the last words of Jesus to the disciples are words of promise: "Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." [Matthew 28:20]

Over the past three months of lockdown, Jesus' promise has brought enormous comfort to us as a congregation and to millions of people throughout the world.

Jesus' words chime with the amazing promise of God found in **Isaiah 43:1-5**:

"But now thus says the Lord, He who created you, O Jacob, He who formed you, O Israel: 'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour... Do not fear, for I am with you."

The presence of God with us in recent days has enabled us to cope with things that we could not have imagined as we entered into 2020 six months ago.

As a Parish Minister, I have spoken to folks who have not been able to see loved ones including parents, children, grandchildren or sick relatives; I have conducted funerals where mourners have been restricted to a dozen; and I have worked with couples who have had to postpone their wedding plans.

In the midst of all of this, more and more people have turned to God, to faith, to the Church, for spiritual nourishment and pastoral support.

When I wrote my last Church Newsletter, I had to announce that Services of Public Worship would have to cease for the foreseeable future - until such times that the Scottish Government feels that the pandemic is under control and large scale gatherings are safe.

As we move into Phase Two of the Scottish Government's Four Phase Plan for exiting lockdown, I am happy to say that we are now able to open our Church Sanctuary for private prayer and reflection - at this stage on a Monday Morning [10.30 - 12.00 Noon] and Thursday Evening [7.00 - 8.30 pm]. Due to strict social distancing measures still in place, only 18 pews are able to be used. A pew can take a single person, a couple, or, a family [who have been in lockdown together]. Places will be allocated by a steward at the church door - on a first-comefirst-served basis. Hopefully, though, over the coming weeks, everyone that wants to come for private prayer and reflection will have the opportunity to do so.

No one knows for certain when Church Services will be able to resume but I know that the Church of Scotland is in constant dialogue with the Scottish Government on this matter. For upto-date information, you can always visit the Church of Scotland Website: www.churchofscotland.org.uk

In the meantime we will continue with our On-Line Sunday Services - which are proving highly popular with congregational members of all ages. Thanks to the technical expertise of one of our younger members, Colin Barr, and the generosity of his company 'Limelight Networks', we are now able to broadcast these services live at 11.00 am every Sunday on our Church Website: www.stmarysmotherwell.org.uk

The service can also be listened to throughout the week - either on the website or via telephone [01698 533200].

As Minister, I would like to say a huge 'thank you' to the congregation for all the positive and encouraging feedback which I have been given about these services. St Mary's congregation is a wonderful Family Church and, like any family during this time of separation, we have worked extra hard to maintain our sense of togetherness. Members of the congregation, in family groups and as individuals, have recorded Calls to Worship, Bible Readings and music which have greatly enhanced our services. Couples have sent in beautiful photos of their Wedding Day accompany **Anniversary** to our Announcements. I have enjoyed 'Happy Birthday' greetings and the joy of announcing the arrival of newborn children and grandchildren.

I am delighted that we have been able to continue the rhythm of our Church Year through the On-Line Services. We have celebrated Easter and Pentecost; we have shared Communion; we have raised £3536 [including Gift Aid] for Christian Aid, we commemorated the 75th Anniversary of VE Day; we have showcased the talents of our Boys Brigade and, most recently, we had an innovative Junior Church Promotion Sunday.

One of the highlights each week has been the slideshow of photos in response to the challenges set by our fabulous Junior Church leaders. Many of these can still be seen on our website, or, Facebook page. I would like to thank everyone who has shared in any way to enrich our services.

We have lots more to look forward to in the weeks ahead as we explore our Summer Theme ['The Fruit of the Holy Spirit']. When I am on holiday [Sundays 19 & 26 July] Rev John Thomson will lead the services. The Summer will also see a Y-Zone Celebration Service, a Pet

Blessing Service, our annual Postcard Competition, and the continuing weekly Junior Church Challenges.

One of the main upsides of the On-Line Sunday Services is that a number of members who weren't able physically to come to church are now able to feel more part of the St Mary's Church Family through accessing the services on-line or via telephone.

The Kirk Session and Congregational Board have formed a small Management Team to guide the congregation through the weeks, and perhaps months, ahead. One of the key items on the Management Team's agenda is making sure that we can continue to broadcast our services online - even when regular Sunday Services can resume.

As I near the close of my Newsletter, I would like to pay tribute to all who have worked so hard, and so faithfully, to keep St Mary's Parish Church going strongly over the past months - including our wonderful staff, fantastic Elders, Junior Church Leaders and enthusiastic helpers and volunteers. Your dedication is appreciated by myself and by all in the Church Family.

FINANCIAL REPORT

It is important that everyone in the Congregation is up-to-date on our financial situation. When I meet members, on the street, while out walking, inevitably, they ask the question about our finances.

I am in a position to inform you that like every other organisation in the country, our finances have suffered during the closure of our Church due to this awful pandemic. We are fortunate that we have a healthy Reserve Fund which within weeks will have to be used to pay our bills and fulfil our financial responsibilities.

Stuart Reid, our Treasurer, has produced a financial prediction to the end of this financial year. His estimate is that our Congregational Account will have a £36,000 deficit. This is the account into which we pay all of the money given on a Sunday morning and through Standing Order and this money is used to pay all of our bills on an ongoing basis. It is clear that we will have to use a large amount of our Reserve to fill the gap in the Congregational Account.

The Appeal I made at the start of the lockdown asking members to consider contributing by Standing Order and signing up to the Gift Aid scheme was well supported and led to an increase in giving by Standing Order from £4,000 per month to well over £6,000 per month. Also, we have a good number of members signed up to the Gift Aid scheme for the first time. This has helped reduce the deficit on our Congregational Account to a much more manageable figure.

We had a number of plans to improve the Church buildings by using part of the Reserve Fund but of course all plans are now on hold because of our financial situation with the exception of:

- 1. The pathway into the Sanctuary from the gate at the corner of our property
- The provision of cameras in the Sanctuary to continue the filming of services to be accessed on our web page.

The cost of the pathway, which is now complete, was financed by the money held for us, in the Consolidated Fabric Fund, by the Church of Scotland. This money can only be used for fabric issues and since this was the case we decided to use it. This money comes from the rental of the Church Officer's house and is paid into the Consolidated Fund on a monthly basis.

The cost of the cameras and some other equipment will be met by the Reserve Fund. Live filming and recorded services will become even more important when the Church re-opens. There may be a drastically reduced number of attendees because of social distancing and in addition many members may be apprehensive about attending worship in the short term. The cost of this is not outwith our budget even though our finances are taking a big hit.

I know from meeting members that many are faithfully filling their envelopes and are anxious to contribute as soon as possible. By the time you read this report our Minister will have announced when these envelopes can be handed in.

Make no mistake our Church will survive this crisis and be aware that our finances are being monitored VERY carefully.

I hope that everyone is keeping safe and well and I thank everyone for their support in this time of crisis.

It will allow much needed level access to the Sanctuary for all users, this means everyone can enter the sanctuary from the Main Door, instead of possibly having to use side door. The path has been laid with stones to complement the church building and has removed the step from Avon St onto the path and the 2 steps into the main door.

We have been able to install lights on the edges of the path due to a generous donation by 2 of our members, my thanks to them for this amazing gesture.

With the church open now for private prayer and hopefully soon for the return of some services, I hope you agree the path looks great as well as being very practical and much safer.

We have also taken the chance to re-install the flood lights that illuminate the beautiful Stained Glass windows at the front of the church, so when we can meet in the evenings in the Sanctuary we can still enjoy our windows.

I'd like to take this chance to thank the Property Team for their continued support and work, also a special thanks to our Jack of all Trades, Church officer, Ian Beattie. Ian has been down to the church most days, cleaning, painting, repairing, designing, supervising Landscapers, you name it, he has done it. The list of tasks Ian has completed is a bulletin in itself, but some of the work done, redesign and decorating of the Coffee Bar, painting of the corridors and of course gardening. If you pass or visit the church you'll see that it has rarely looked better. Well done Ian and thanks.

Finally, thanks to everyone who contributes or helps with the church buildings.

End of (abbreviated!) Session

EARLY END OF SESSION

Just as the last church magazine was going to print the country went into lockdown and brought about an early end to the BB session.

Friday 13 March was our last physical meeting as a Company and put on hold some of the events and activities in our calendar for an unknown period of time.

One of the first priorities was to work out how we would complete the work of the boys on the Queen's Badge programme...they had literally just finished supporting Ups & Downs Theatre Group with the stewarding at their show in Hamilton Townhouse and only had to write up their reports and attend the completion course to gain their badge.

Fortunately, by emailing documents backwards and forwards and filming video reviews of their record books we managed to get their awards signed off and the requirement to attend a completion course was relaxed as the course had to be cancelled!

With no physical activities possible the remaining Battalion competitions were scrapped and a decision was made quickly (unlike the SPFL!) that the Battalion Flag Championship would be suspended this year with no winner announced.

BATTALION REVIEW &

The 114 Annual Battalion Review was the first of a kind as it was presented via the YouTube online video platform and was broadcast on Friday 15 May.

As a company we used the Zoom video conferencing platform and got all the boys, officers and our company section elders onto a video call where we all watched the Battalion Review presentation. We enjoyed watching Battalion President Mr Alan Anderson announce the winners of the Battalion competitions and the recipients of the President's and Queen's Badges.

At 13 Motherwell we have had a successful year in the competitions - 4 first places (Bible Knowledge, Quiz, Junior Football and Swimming), 2 runners up places (Restricted Drill, Senior Football) and a third place (First Aid)...not bad out of a total of 8 competitions!

While it is nice to have success as a Company it is particularly pleasing to see boys within the Company achieve special individual awards. More on this further on in the article...

Following the Battalion Review presentation we remained online as a company and presented our special awards for the session:

This year our Junior Sports Champion was Alex Maxwell and our Senior Sports Champion was won jointly by Adam Blair and Scott Rankin.

We also present 2 awards in recognition of boys who have made a particular contribution during the session or set an example to the other boys.

This year the Officers' Endeavour award was presented to Cameron Gunn and the Captain Mathie Commendation was presented to James MacIntosh.

PRESIDENT'S BADGES

We had 2 of our senior boys achieve their President's Badge this year: **Andrew Gardiner and James Leckie**.

This is the second highest award in the BB and involves completing the discovery badge programme in 5 key areas: Adventure, Community, Leadership, Interest and Physical.

QUEEN'S BADGES

The Queen's Badge is the highest award in the Boy's Brigade and requires the young men to make some demanding commitments during the course of the programme.

Adam Blair, James MacIntosh and Scott Rankin are all Sergeants in the Company and are all worthy recipients of the Queen's Badge. All 3 young men have given a great deal of time both to the company in their leadership roles and also to the community over the course of the last year. They have all developed through the process and have had an impact in each of the areas where they have worked.

Completing the Queen's Badge programme is not just about getting the award (although it is a proud moment for us all!) and I am sure that these outstanding young men will see it as the foundation for even greater things.

The officers of 13 Motherwell congratulate the 3 young men on their achievements and wish them all the best for the future!

SERVICE OF CELEBRATION

On Sunday 14 June we were delighted to participate in the St Mary's online worship along with the Anchor Boys and Junior Section. The service had a Boys' Brigade theme and was a nice celebration of the boys' efforts over the session.

Personal Protective Equipment

CrossReach has residential services throughout Scotland. Each one of these services has had to put in place additional measures to protect the residents and the staff. All of its residential services are home to the people who live there. As part of its ethos, CrossReach is maintaining that home feeling as much as possible, while balancing it with the clinical needs of the current pandemic and relatives' expectations to wear PPE. Like most care homes and other residential settings, CrossReach services were not set up as clinical establishments. Therefore, providing the necessary resources to all residential services which includes gowns, masks, visors and associated equipment has been at the forefront of their efforts. Every week, personal protective equipment is arriving at the CrossReach central distribution site and being distributed by a staff team co-opted from other duties. Since my last report, it is an understatement to say that the world has changed. We have heard so much bad news, so many people dying, some of those amongst our own family and friends. Our lives, our living conditions have been affected by the Coronavirus pandemic. Although these have been difficult times a lot of good has been coming out of this. The comradery of the people in our community; the community spirit; the hand of friendship to help with shopping; random parcels and letters being posted through our doors and people acknowledging one another as they smile when they are out for their daily walk.

Unfortunately, I was not able to distribute 'Transform' the Scottish Bible Society's Spring magazine. However, an update I would like to give you is the success of Bible 2020. It took SBS years of planning, hundreds of meetings and hours of prayer and petition and has become the largest campaign to date. Bible 2020 was launched on the first of January. People around the world all read the same passage of the Bible aloud every day for a year. It has become a global movement. Numbers recorded in Spring are over 17,000 people in over 100 countries taking part and downloading the Bible 2020 app. Stephen Opie, Chief Operating Officer, Bible Society New Zealand said "Maybe the promises of Scripture spoken aloud will linger over our cities until God brings then to fruition. Maybe God's Words will bring peace to those who desperately need it right now. May God use Bible 2020 to change our nation and our world!"

Despite severe economic, social and environmental issues in countries around the world, the Bible Societies are continuing to fulfil its mission to provide the life-transforming Word of God to people who need it. The Gospel is spreading to the ends of the earth. Last year marked a 5 year high for the number of Bible translations launched by the United Bible Societies Fellowship: 90 languages used by 617 million people.

At the present time, we are unable to organise our 2 annual fundraising projects. Hopefully, in the not-to-distant future, we will be able to do this. Like all charities, SBS need funds to continue their work at home and abroad.

I would like to conclude my report by wishing you all to stay safe and keep well. I look forward to the day when once more we will be reunited and worship together as a family in our church.

At the beginning of lockdown, there was dismay amongst Christian Aid volunteers. All the fundraising events planned around Christian Aid Week and beyond had to be cancelled, or at least indefinitely postponed. This was at a time when Christian Aid was facing a rapidly increasing level of need, partly caused by the virus that was cutting off so much of its fundraising.

Here in St Mary's, Bryce took the initiative of opening a 'Just Giving' page for Christian Aid, linked to the church's website and explained to the congregation at an online Sunday service. This enabled and encouraged St Mary's' people to keep on supporting Christian Aid, even at this difficult time, and resulted in £2900 being raised for Christian Aid plus a further £600 in Gift Aid. (The Just Giving page is still active.)
