Dear Friends:

EASTER

As I write this letter, looking out of the Manse Office window, I can see the daffodils looking resplendent in the Spring sunshine. To me, daffodils are always a sign of Easter - their vibrant colour symbolising the new life that we have in Jesus our Risen Lord.

This Easter, St Mary's Parish Church will be sharing in some joint services and activities with our friends and neighbours from the other Motherwell Church of Scotland congregations. We are hoping that some of the other denominations in Motherwell might also want to join in with us.

On the Monday of Holy Week [11th April] there will be an Easter Labyrinth at Motherwell South Parish Church. It will be open from 10:00 am till 12 Noon, 2:00 pm till 4:00 pm, and 7:00 pm till 9:00 pm. A Labyrinth is an opportunity to walk around several stations. At each station there will be something to look at, listen to, or reflect upon. I have been involved in creating Labyrinths in the past and they are always a popular event. You can visit the Labyrinth at any of the above times and walk round at your own pace.

On the **Thursday of Holy Week** [14th April] a Maundy Thursday Communion will be held in Dalziel St Andrews Parish Church at 7.30 pm.

On the **Friday of Holy Week** [15^{th} April], we move to North Motherwell Parish Church for a Good Friday Service - again at 7:30 pm.

On **Easter Sunday** [17th April] we will hold a short Outdoor Easter Service at 8:00 am in the Duchess of Hamilton Park. This will be followed by an Easter Breakfast in *St Mary's Parish Church Halls*.

You are very welcome to any, or all, of these Joint Easter events.

Our own Easter Sunday Morning Service will be held at the usual time of 11:00 am and will take the form of a Family Celebration - an opportunity to sing the great Easter Hymns and read and reflect upon the Resurrection of Jesus. If Covid allows, it would be wonderful to see the Church bustling with life on such a special Sunday in the Christian Year.

MOVE FORWARD IN FAITH

In the New Year Edition of the Church Bulletin, I intimated that St Mary's Parish Church Kirk Session would be reviewing our Five-Year Mission Plan - much of which was put on hold during the various Covid lockdowns. I am happy to say that this process is well under way and a new and exciting plan will be published soon!

Concurrently, the new Presbytery of Forth Valley and Clydesdale, of which the former Hamilton Presbytery is now a part, is working with congregations to establish a new Presbytery Plan. All Presbyteries in Scotland are undergoing this process as a direct instruction from last year's General Assembly. The Presbytery Plan must take account of the fact that there will be a 40% reduction in Ministry Personnel by 2025. This reduction is due to more Ministers retiring than starting training, and a lack of funding for Ministers and Church Buildings at the national and local level.

The Kirk Session of St Mary's Parish Church will, of course, give a very strong account of our congregation and its strategic importance within the Motherwell Community. Every single one of us, though, must play our part now if we want to assure the future of our congregation. A bustling Sunday Congregation, a vibrant Junior Church, and busy and active Church Organisations, for all ages, are the foundations on which we must build as we seek to reach out into our Parish and Community in the days ahead.

A NEW PRAYER INITIATIVE

In Luke's Gospel, we read: "Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after He had finished, one of His disciples said to Him, 'Lord, teach us to pray..." [Luke 11:1]

Prayer has always been a central part of the Christian Faith - both congregational prayer and our own private prayer lives.

Many churches that I have been involved in, during my lifetime, have had Prayer Chain Ministries - a simple, effective, and powerful way to encouraging members to pray for one another, church, parish, community, country, and world.

Establishing a Prayer Chain Ministry in St Mary's Parish Church was a central component in our Vision 20:20 Mission Plan and will be vital, too, within our new Five-Year Plan for Mission. Led by our Student Minister, Hazel Shaw, a small group have been working on the practicalities of establishing a Prayer Chain Ministry. As Minister, I am happy to say that it is ready to start in the weeks ahead.

Two secure Prayer Boxes have been purchased: one for each of the main Church entrances. Three Prayer Chain Co-ordinators have been identified - Hazel, Margaret Carrol, and Helen Calder. Prayer Request Cards have also been printed and are ready to be used.

Anyone with a Prayer Request [on Sundays or midweek] will be able to write that request on a Prayer Card and place it in one of the secure Prayer Box. Only the Prayer Chain Co-ordinators will empty these boxes. You can ask for prayer for yourself, for someone else, or for a particular situation. If seeking prayer for someone else, it is always important to ask their permission first. Prayer Requests can give specific details [Please Pray for Bryce as he recovers from his chest infection etc]. Or they can be less specific [Please Prayer for a woman going for hospital tests etc.]

On a specific day, during the week, the Prayer Co-ordinators will collate the Prayer Requests and send them as an E-Mail to those who wish to be part of the Prayer Chain. Members of the Prayer Chain will be able to read the E-Mail and pray for those seeking prayer. All of this will be done with the utmost confidentiality. Nothing is too big or too small to be prayed for.

Currently, we are seeking people of all ages to be part of the Prayer Chain. As Minister, I am aiming big! In my previous congregation we had over 50 on the Prayer Chain. In the Edinburgh Church I worshipped in during my Theological Studies there were over 90. For those seeking prayer, it is both wonderful and powerful to know that lots of people are praying for you and your request.

If you wish to be part of the Prayer Chain, please let Hazel, Margaret, Helen, or myself know as soon as possible. All we will need from you will be your E-Mail Address. Again, your E-Mail will be treated completely confidentially and will not be shared with others in the Prayer Chain.

In **John Chapter 17**, we are told that, on the night before He went to the Cross at Calvary, Jesus prayed, in the Garden of Gethsemane, for His disciples and all who would come after them. As our Lord prayed and prays for us, let us be encouraged to pray for one another.

UKRAINE

As I end this letter, I would like to encourage us all to pray for the peoples of Ukraine and for all who suffer the horrors of war the world over.

St Mary's Parish Church have set up a Just Giving page to collect money for the DEC Ukraine Appeal. Many have already contributed. If you haven't, and would like to, you can access the Just Giving Page via our Church Website [where you will find the appropriate link]. Our website is: www.stmarysmotherwell.org.uk

If you don't have internet access, you can simply place a donation in an envelope marked 'UKRAINE APPEAL' and either bring it to Church or post it in the Church Letter Box.

If you would like to find out how to support a Ukrainian Refugee in your home, please contact myself directly and I should be able to help you with this process.

As your Minister and Pastor, I would like to wish you all a very blessed Easter time.

PRAYER CHAIN



We can testify to the wonderful blessing that prayer is when you are the recipient and also the blessing that comes from praying for others.

There are multiple verses in the Bible encouraging us to pray for others and many reasons that praying helps every one of us at different points in our lives.

The requests will be shared in an email and sent to those who would like to willingly and faithfully commit to praying for those individuals and the situations named in the email. Again, confidentiality will be maintained.

If anyone feels that they would like to be one of our prayer warriors and commit to pray for those named in the email then please also contact Helen, Margaret or Hazel.

This is a really important ministry and we encourage you all to prayerfully consider this opportunity to pray and be prayed for by others in our church family here in St Mary's.

NOT THE COFFEE MORNING

We had hoped to return to our regular coffee morning in December 2021 but with case numbers on the increase and the approach of the Omicron variant at the time we decided it wouldn't be wise to try to bring so many people together at the same time so we had to park our plan for another year.

The virtual coffee morning had been a huge success in 2020 so we decided to offer a slightly scaled back version of it in 2021 - the 'Not the Coffee Morning'. This involved issuing members of the congregation, friends and families of the BB with a small pouch of coffee, tea and biscuits to have a coffee/tea and think about the work of the BB. UPDATE

Christian Aid, like other international aid charities, must maintain its ongoing work to alleviate poverty and inequality while also responding to urgent emergencies.

As a member of the Disasters Emergency Committee, Christian Aid is actively responding to humanitarian crises in Afghanistan and Ukraine. St Mary's members have contributed to Bryce's appeals for both situations.

In Afghanistan, conflict, poverty, covid and the worst drought in 27 years have brought the country into crisis. Christian Aid and its partners are reaching people most in need and supplying them with food, nutrition, and hygiene kits. Through 2 partners they aim to reach around 17,000 people with food packages and provide over 850 pregnant women, new mothers and malnourished infants with additional nutritional support.

In the dreadful situation unfolding in Ukraine, where at least 3 million people have fled their homes to escape the conflict and where increasing numbers of civilians are being killed or injured, Christian Aid is working with 2 partner organisations in the ACT Alliance (a global faith-based coalition) to help desperate refugees. So far, 28 tonnes of food supplies and other lifesaving essentials have been distributed to people on the Ukrainian borders. A refugee help point has also been established.

The support you have already given has been much appreciated by Christian Aid. Please continue to help in any way you can. Bryce's Just Giving page for Ukraine is still open and there will be additional opportunities to contribute during Christian Aid Week in May.

At the Kirk Session Meeting in February, it was with sorrow that I had to report that the Motherwell Action Group had been disbanded. St Mary's has had an excellent and long connection with the Scottish Bible Society. Volunteers from our Church have worked as District Organiser; Speakers, who would visit Churches and Guilds; Chairpersons; Secretaries and Church Representatives. The valued support, prayers and encouragement from our Church members has been greatly appreciated throughout this time.

For many years as Secretary of the group, I have written to Motherwell Churches asking for support by sending a Representative from their Church to join the Action Group. Only a few Churches responded to this request. Unfortunately, over the past few years, the number of committee members had fallen due to personal reasons.

In June, last year, I wrote to 20 Churches of all denominations in the Motherwell area hoping to recruit new members. Only two replied saying that they were unable at this time but would keep us in their prayers.

As a result of this response, the committee concluded that the group could no longer function due to lack of personnel. A further letter in January of this year was then sent to all of the Churches to inform them that the Motherwell Action Group had been disbanded, but thanked them for their past support and prayers. Churches have been asked to continue supporting the valued and vital work of Scottish Bible Society on an individual basis.

I am assured that St Mary's will continue with their loyal support for the Scottish Bible Society and I would like to take this opportunity to thank you most sincerely for the tremendous support you have given to previous personnel and me.
