By the time you read this, the members of the Work Party will have finished their various jobs for another year. It is worth setting out who the members are: Ian Beaton, Graham Currie Ian Dick, Peter Fergusson, Allan Joyce, Tom Knox, David Maxwell, Graham McNay and Bill Taylor. Some of these men have been members since the Work Party was formed many years ago by Bobby Liddell.

This session as well as working in and around the church, we have also been working in the Manse garden. The garden at the front is relatively small and easy to maintain. The opposite is the case at the rear. The garden at the rear is large, with lawns, shrubs, trees paths, all requiring weekly and maintenance. The grass at the rear is being cut once every 2 weeks. At the height of the growing season, the cuttings fill a brown wheelie bin after each cut. A fence and gate have also been repaired, and preservative applied to the timber.



Following the success of our 2014 camp we returned to our favourite camp location at Badaguish Outdoor Centre, near Aviemore in the Cairngorms for Summer Camp 2015.

With a record 36 boys and 12 officers, the now extended convoy of 3 minibuses, the Chapman's Landover and trailer and a couple of officers' cars managed to load up and ship out all our camping stuff and luggage for 5 days of adventure.

After a lunch stop in Aviemore we descended on Badaguish and began the process of making ourselves at home - 13 tents had to go up this year, a NEW flag pole to be erected, the kitchen had to be organised, 12 months of dust washed from our travelling crockery and utensils, the mammoth online shop had to be unpacked and the tuck shop retail outlet needed stocked and organised.

At Badaguish we have a great set-up that gives us best of both worlds - plenty of flat dry camping ground complemented by indoor cooking and dining facilities and a modern toilet/shower block.

The boys made an excellent job of setting up the tents so after an afternoon of settling in we enjoyed our first meal together and then set off for a stroll down to Loch Morlich. This is always the point at camp when we are reminded just how vicious the Aviemore midges are!!

Autumn 2015 sees the 100th anniversary of the formation of 13th Motherwell Boys' Brigade Company.

<u>Parents' night</u>

The 2014/2015 session of the Junior section came to a close in May at our annual parent's night. This year the parent's night display piece involved the boys showing off their drill skills and recreating the story of Noah. The officers, boys and parents alike also appreciated the opportunity to reflect on some of the highlights from the session, including the Christmas coffee morning performance, the good luck video message to Mr Fraser (who recently completed the London Marathon) and the 2014 camp.

In addition the parent's night provided us with the opportunity to recognise the accomplishments of every individual boy via the presentation of badges within the Junior Section Achievement programme.

Inspection Results

Throughout the session the boys undergo a weekly inspection in which points are awarded for each individual aspect of their uniform (jumper, armband, trousers, shoes), clean hands and face, attendance at Church/Sunday school and behaviour. The weekly scores were collated and the results were announced during the parents night. There were 2 runners up positions and the boy with the highest score was awarded the coveted **BBig Cheese Award**. The results were:

In addition there was also a best squad, based on inspection points. This year the **Best Squad** was **Squad 3**.

Special Recognition Awards

The Junior Section boys are a remarkable group of young men who consistently demonstrate high levels of commitment and good behaviour. As a result, each year the officers face the unenviable task of trying to select a small number of these boys to receive one of the Junior Section special recognition awards. This year after lengthy email and face to face discussions the officers finally decided on the recipients for these prizes. These prizes were awarded throughout the course of the parent's night and are also detailed below.

<u>Best in Year</u>

One of the ways we acknowledge individual merit is by selecting a **'Best in Year'** for each of the 3 year groups. This year these prizes were awarded as follows:

These 3 boys consistently demonstrated excellent manners; kindness; commitment to the Boys' Brigade and enthusiasm for the various activities and events that were undertaken throughout the year.

Sportsman and Leading Boy

We also had an award for **Best Sportsman** which this year went to **Ross Andrew**, for his contribution to our football competition and the excellent sportsmanship that he demonstrates at all times.

Our newest award is the Leading Boy trophy which is designed to acknowledge the important role our squad leading boys play within the Junior Section. Leading boys are third years who have been selected by the officers to be responsible for 'leading' their squad. This means ensuring that their squads are well behaved during the opening and closing services and supporting younger members of the section throughout the night. 

I regret to report that the annual Flag Day will not take place this year. Diminished help from our churches has been experienced over past years and the decision was made that it could no longer be supported.




